Farewell message from Mr Glaser



One really important aspect of school life that has always been good but that has improved significantly recently is "student voice". We need to hear your views.

Some of the most memorable moments this year have involved members of our community speaking openly about their own journeys, their own anxieties and how they have overcome them. I have found these moments very moving.

Two, however, have stood out. Kate, Polina and Roman talking to us about their recent experiences in Ukraine and most recently a number of our Lower Sixth Students delivered a really powerful presentation on reproductive rights in light of the US Supreme Court's recent decision.

Students – use your voice – be heard. You have spoken loudly this year about LGBTQ rights, about the rights of everyone no matter their sexuality, gender, race or belief. About anxiety, about injustice. About war, About reproductive rights. Be loud. Be challenging. In the pursuit of a better world – be difficult.

Contribute – not just in our community but beyond. Be a changemaker!

I offer the following advice to our Upper Sixth leavers:

Avoid negativity – being negative and negative people. Life's too short to hang around with people who bring you down.

Treat everyone with kindness – and I mean everyone. It means a huge amount to people. I might be the Headmaster but it doesn't make me better than anyone else. I love the fact that one of my colleagues always says "alright mate" as he goes past. It's an honour being considered as a mate to John and it indicates a community that is at ease with itself.

Have Fun – life is there to be enjoyed.

Accept a compliment – when someone says you look great it is because you look great. Don't say "no I don't I look awful". Simply say "thanks"

My advice to everyone is communicate kindly, even if you are telling someone something they don't want to hear.

Everyone has been so kind and generous and I want to thank everyone for the lovely presents that I have received and the donations to our Leave Your Mark campaign.

This community is amazing. When I meet prospective students with their parents I say that I hope they will find a warm, welcoming, together community. No clones. No robots. Everyone is comfortable being themselves. But alongside this warmth I want you to see hardworking and ambitious teachers and students. That is what we aim for and visitors always report back that this is exactly what they find.

Keep working hard, keep aiming high and keep looking after each other. In the words of our chaplain – enjoy your wild and precious lives.

It has been an honour and a privilege to work at this wonderful school.



Metal detecting

Two of our Taunton School chefs have unearthed a haul of historical finds on our campus after taking up metal detecting during the pandemic.

Neil McKellar and Peter Council, who between them have worked in Taunton School's kitchens for over 30 years, have found many interesting artefacts, including a Victorian Golden Jubilee token from 1887.

The chefs make sure to share their finds with students and staff in our history department that everyone can learn about what life was like at Taunton School hundreds of years ago.

The pair are looking for new places to dig in the county and hope that their story will help to inspire others to take up 'beeping' in the future.

Neil says 'Metal detecting is such an interesting hobby, and we feel lucky that we work for a place that is so happy for us to explore our passion and learn more about the history of our county and the school. Finding these lost relics is so exciting; it makes you wonder who or what was happening when that object was dropped into the earth.'

Beginning with a rainy stop in Wells, the students visited what many regard as the most beautiful cathedral in the country, admiring its scissor arches, beautiful stained glass, stiff leaf carving, astronomical clock and chapter house, before walking through the C14th Vicars' Close and enjoying lunch in the Bishop's Palace and Garden.

The weather perked up for an exploration of the ruins of Glastonbury Abbey, followed by the traditional singing competition in the Abbey grounds during which Late Modern block C's rendition of the Blackadder-inspired theme of 'The baby-eating Bishop of Bath and Wells' triumphed.

It was great to take a break from the classroom with such a receptive group of students.

Pride Month Chapel

In celebration of June being Pride Month, the LGBTQIA+ Society led a pride chapel service with sixth form students Charlie and Moni. Charlie was asked about his thoughts on what pride means to him:

For most of the students, it was their first time going to a research library, and they were very impressed with the facilities and helpful staff at BTC. The visit was a great kick-start to the students' research for over the summer break.

Year 10 WW1 battlefields trip report

With the lifting of Covid restrictions, the History Department was able to resume its annual WWI battlefields trip over half term and duly accompanied 40 eager Year 10 students to the Somme and Ypres.

Having been re-routed from Calais to Dunkirk, we stopped first at Vimy, scene of Canadian heroics in 1917, and admired the impressive, gleaming white monument atop the ridge. Then it was off to Newfoundland Park, a memorial to the Newfoundlanders, a terrible proportion of whom died on the first day of the battle of the Somme, where we could walk in the well-preserved trenches and gain an excellent idea of the battlefield itself. Having walked down to the German front line, past shell holes and the adjacent cemeteries, we left for Thiepval where Lutyens' monument bears the names of over 70,000 British and Commonwealth troops whose bodies were never recovered, among them several OTs.

The crater of Lochnagar was next on the agenda, and the day ended with a visit to the poignant Devonshire cemetery.

The second day of the trip focused on Ypres, beginning with an exploration of the redug but atmospheric trenches at Bayernwald with bunkers and mineshafts; Hitler fought here and was awarded his Iron Cross nearby. The museum and trenches of Sanctuary Wood near Hill 62 were next.

Three cemeteries followed, first among them the intensely moving Tynecot, scene of the infamous battle of Passchendaele, where OT Cyril Cook's gravestone is but one of 12,000. The German cemetery of Langmark provided a contrast of style and setting. A haunting site, it contains over 40,000 bodies, a scarcely credible 25,000 in one mass grave. Finally, there was a brief visit to Essex Farm where a 15-year-

old lies buried and where John McCrae composed 'In Flanders Fields'.

A foray to Leonidas chocolate shop soon banished any thoughts of tiredness and in the evening we joined some two or three thousand others in attending the daily Last Post ceremony at the Menin Gate where a wreath was presented in memory of the 168 OTs who lost their lives during the conflict.

Many thanks to Mr Gallimore who organised everything, as well as to Miss Wainwright and Mr Wells who also gave up part of their holiday to come along.

TS students world average again in 2022 IB Diploma results

Twenty-two students from Taunton School have achieved outstanding results in the first post-Covid year of assessments. The school is celebrating a 100% pass rate with an average of 34 points, exceeding the world average by almost two full points.

Outstanding individual achievements include:

Top scorer and Head Girl Ruth Garang achieved a score of 42. Ruth joined Taunton School from local comprehensive Taunton Academy after gaining an IB scholarship. While at Taunton School, Ruth was heavily involved in academic clubs including debating, Model UN and Amnesty International and was accepted into the school's Pre-Med programme. In September,



Ruth will begin her studies at her first choice university, Queen Mary University of London, to pursue Medicine. She hopes to specialise in Psychiatry or General Practice and to travel alongside her studies.

Ruth said, "I have absolutely loved every minute of my time at Taunton School. The opportunities here are endless. I am so happy with my results, I was incredibly nervous; I want to say a big thank you to all of my friends and teachers, whose support during my time at Taunton School has been incredible."

Joint second top achievers are Blanca Osuna from Spain and Vas Smychkovich from The Netherlands who achieved 39 points. Blanca joined Taunton School from Argentina and will now be studying Biology at Bristol University. Vas joined Taunton School's dedicated international school, Taunton School International, before beginning her IB studies at Taunton School and will be studying Neuroscience at King's College, London or at the Karolinska Institutet in Sweden.
